

### FLOODS - NATURAL OR HUMAN-MADE DISASTERS?



I travelled extensively during the summer vacation in the months of June and July. One of my trips was a round trip: from Jammu to Kashmir, Kashmir to Kargil, Kargil to Zanskar, Zanskar to Darcha, Darcha to Manali and Manali to Jammu. Another trip was to Bengaluru. I also travelled to Mcleodganj & Dharmashala, Jalandhar and Hoshiarpur. Yet another trip with which concluded my summer vacation was from Jammu to Kanyakumari, and from Kanyakumari to Jammu.

During all these trips, one common factor I found in all these places was massive road constructions. Hon'ble minister Nitin Gadkari is on a mission. For our comfort and for better business outreach, we need better and broader roads. To build such roads, agrarian lands, forest lands, mountains, and river banks are compromised. To have better road and rail connectivity, we set aside our conscience and began to construct long tunnels through huge mountains. Having broader roads means loss of thousands of acres of agrarian and forest lands. The long tunnels and the broader roads need long flyovers in the valleys and bridges across the rivers. Hence, river paths are often narrowed as we witness in our own City of Temples with the river path of Tawi river being narrowed. Bridges across the rivers mean huge columns in the rivers and its banks, and in the valleys.

Development has its own cost. What cost are we willing to pay? What is the cost do we currently pay? Animal species are being extinct, because we have unethically and illegally occupied their habitation – the forest. Unpredictable, and intemperate weather conditions are now norm of the day, because we have unfairly and criminally fell myriad of trees. Unprecedented and unparalleled landslides frequently occur, because our mighty mountains are now frail and friable.




Catastrophic and calamitous floods is now alarmingly a regular feature, because flood paths are mostly shut, river paths are obstructed, ponds and lakes are increasingly shrinking and are being levelled up.

Hence, our towns and cities get sunk (as in the case of Joshimath, Tapovan and Gulabkoti). Our houses, hotels, shops, vehicles and other belongings are washed away by the raging flood waters (as in the case of recent frightening floods in various towns in Punjab and Manali). Our recently constructed highways and expressways are eroded (as in the case of National Highways to Srinagar from Jammu, from Mandi to Manali), and highway bridge caved in (as in the case near Kathua - J & K). I hope that you do agree with me that such disasters are no more natural, but human-made.

Have we found leisure and comfort? Or are we in for more trouble and distress? A question we sincerely need to probe and answer. Where has our search for comfort landed us in? What have we lost in trying to find more ease and coziness? The worse is yet to come. For, we are not ready to learn yet. In our greed for comfort and luxury, we lost our stewardship, our foresight, our conscience. We are unfortunately on our drive to selfannihilation. Yet we are leaping forward. We are regrettably blinded by our urge for hurried development. In the name of development, we are awkwardly on the path of destruction – of our planet, and the future of our younger generation. No doubt, we need development – an accountable development, and a caring development, development with а foresightedness, conscience and healing touch.










# Mathematics is not just about numbers and equations, it is about reasoning and understanding
